PRESIDENT'S REVIEW



Advancing the Status of Women Worldwide through Service and Advocacy

President Wendy Bruce

The 2019-2020 Zonta year has been a rewarding and challenging time. We can be proud of our club and its achievements. All of our committees have stayed focussed on our core business – improving the legal, political, economic, educational, and health status of women and girls both locally and internationally and in doing sowe have raised the profile of Zonta.

Locally we have continued to support girls' education through our secondary school scholarships at Mitcham Girls and Adelaide High Schools and at an international level through our fundraising efforts we have contributed to improving girls' educational opportunities in Madagascar.

We also began our first foray into developing girls' leadership skills by partnering with the YWCA to deliver the *She Leads High* program for girls at the two aforementioned schools.

At the tertiary level we awarded the inaugural University of South Australia Community Development Grant to a student researching the effects on children who have been removed from domestic violence environments and at the international level through our fundraising have assisted women pursue careers in aerospace, business, public affairs and technology.



At the international level we have supported vulnerable and refugee women in Jordan, and the elimination of child marriage. This nexus between local and international activities is important as it puts us on both an international and a local stage as members lobby and contribute to discussions with august bodies such as the United Nations and locally with state governments and peak bodies such as the National Council of Women.

We have continued to advocate against gender based violence against women through the 16 Days of Activism campaign and submissions to government in relation to Domestic Violence, Homelessness and the Decriminalisation of Sex Work. Our hands-on service to women has continued to be a central part of our work.

With the help of our Silent Sewers partners we were able to deliver 670 Breast Cushions to St Andrew's Hospital.

We added Immanuel College to Adelaide High School and Seymour College as partners in our Birthing Kits project and with their help produced 2400 kits which help to produce safe birthing environments for women in third world countries.

On two mornings a week members volunteer at the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service packing and delivering food courtesy of OzHarvest and Bakers Delight and working in the used clothing shop.

Our membership has remained healthy with the addition of five new members and the return of another. We hope this continues.

The challenges have been exacerbated by the corona virus and its impact on our club and its members. We were unable to meet our fundraising target and this will be even more difficult in the coming year. This means that we will need to reassess our project priorities in the immediate future.

We will also need to look at the way we do business. We have already begun to do that by moving increasingly to an online presence and by conducting meetings remotely. We will need to extend our thinking and become more creative about our projects. I am sure that we will rise to this challenge.

My thanks go to the Board for their support and advice, to committee chairs for their untiring work and to all of our members for their commitment to the club and to being part of a world wide fellowship of women supporting other women.



SERVICE

Our aim is to be involved in club projects as well as supporting the activities and aims of District 23.

We have not only had the support of our committee members but many club members have been involved in a number of the successful projects that we have undertaken this year.

Breast Cushions

This year with the help of the Silent Sewers (a group of friends set up by Dymphna Sprod who sew the cushions four times a year) we delivered 670 cushions to St Andrew's Hospital.

About 20 people meet at a designated home and sew the prepared cushions ready for packing. The next day Zonta club members meet at Ivanka Jovanovich's home to pack the cushions and then deliver them.

We are very grateful to Dymphna for organising her group because this is the only way we can produce enough to cope with demand at St Andrew's.

Ivanka has a number of people who help in the preparation of the cushions; Vesna who cuts the cushions; Eleanor who turns and sews the ends of the straps and Kathleen who is involved at many stages of the work. We couldn't do this project without them so we say a big thank you to all involved.

Ivanka and Angela Vandellis attended the St Andrew's Breast Care Luncheon on behalf of our club where we were able to mount a display about Zonta and the work we do. We received a number of donations from participants at the event who also expressed their gratitude for our work. We are grateful for any help to defray the mounting costs of the materials used.

We were very pleased to be invited to Ashbrook where Jennifer Stehn is a resident for afternoon tea. She had organised this event with the craft group to give us the opportunity to talk about Zonta International and the work that we do locally.

Alison Menaud from the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service Domestic Violence Service where we volunteer also attended to give the residents an insight into the domestic violence problem in Australia and in Adelaide in particular.



Birthing Kits

We have been able to support the assembly of four birthing kit workshops this year. In June we held an event at Seymour College where mainly Year 8/9 students supported by Senior Leaders prepared 600 packs. In September we held a similar workshop at Adelaide High School

The Year 12 students at Seymour College conducted a Birthing Kit workshop as their contribution to the school in recognition of their years at the school.

In December we were asked to help Immanuel College conduct an assembly day. A group of our members volunteered their time and again completed 600 packs.

We are grateful to the staff and students of all these schools who are committed to helping women in developing countries overseas.

Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service

We have continued to support this service and we are acknowledged as a very valuable service in the community. Both of our two teams of members have worked hard to ensure that the women at the shelter and those living in the community benefit from our work.

A team of four delivers bread to the clients in the 11 units and then packs the bread for clients attending the group activities at the centre on Wednesday. We then work in the donations shed to sort the clothes and serve the clients who love "shopping" at the shed.

We are at times almost overwhelmed by the amount of clothes that we receive but the turnover can also be very quick at times.

The Wednesday team pack and distribute food supplied by OzHarvest both to the resident clients and often more importantly to the people housed in motels waiting for a place in the shelter. They are often asked to deliver the packs to the motels which they are more than willing to do to save the staff having to do this task. We again helped the Centre staff to prepare for Christmas but the Christmas party had to be cancelled due to the hot weather. The families still received their presents but missed out on seeing Father Christmas.

We are again in the process of renewing our clearances to work with children and vulnerable people. This is yet another new process but once completed will last for five years. The club's contribution to this project, although varied and often quite onerous, is valued by the staff and clients.

Our thanks are extended to all the Service Committee members who contribute in a variety of ways and to the club members who also helped us to achieve positive outcomes





for our committee and the club.

ADVOCACY

All members are committed to Advocacy and Service

Advocacy is one of the two major foci of Zonta clubs around the world. The other, of course, is Service. We exist to advocate for changes in attitudes, actions and laws that discriminate against women. The Advocacy Committee of the Zonta Club of Adelaide is a group of enthusiastic and committed women.

The Advocacy Committee continued to work to support Club members' advocacy work in 2019/2020, both as individuals and as a club.

The difficulty is that there are multiple issues requiring our input and selecting ones of highest priority and within our capability is a challenge.

The priority areas for the work of the committee have been advocating for ways to reduce domestic violence through educational programs such as Respectful Relationships and 16 Days of Activism, homelessness among older women, and developing programs to promote leadership among young women.

Specifically members made contact with Catherine House and made a submission to the YourSay Website on the issues related to homelessness among older women.



Campbelltown Council used flyers adapted from those seen at the Centennial Anniversary Conference listing contact details for assistance for victims of domestic violence during 16 Days of Activism. Members participated in the march on White Ribbon Day.

Support-in-kind for the Women's Centre recommenced following an interruption due to management issues.



Unfortunately the application for a Zonta Centenary Grant from Zonta International for She Leads, a collaborative project with the YWCA, Mitcham Girls' High and Adelaide High School was unsuccessful. Nonetheless, the project proceeded successfully with support from the Advocacy, Awards and Membership committees. The sessions were held on a roster at both schools and graduates of the program presented at a Club meeting.



We presented and participated in Advocacy segments at many club meetings.

Advocacy Committee members organised a successful fundraising event at Mitcham Girl's High. This was a Vintage Parade with clothes of the 60s and 70s in a great environment. It was a fun filled occasion.


Pamela provided us with the history of the Cameleers coming to SA, the social context of the times and the establishment of many businesses developed in that corner of the city.

This has been a mixed year with the committee welcoming an awardee of a new scholarship and having to recommend some club cuts to other scholarships. It has been an honour to work with this group of club members who have come together to discuss and find solutions to some difficult issues.

University of South Australia Community Development Grant

Our club welcomed our inaugural University of South Australia Community Development Grant awardee Kelly Cramp a Social Work Honours student, to two club meetings. Her research was on the topic of "The Removal of Children in Domestic Violence- a Service Providers Perspective". Kelly, as a mature aged student with two young children, commenced university studies to improve her job prospects, prove to herself she could achieve at university and provide a role model to her children. Her research and exposure in the child protection field resulted in her obtaining First Class Honours and employment in this field, where she will continue research on the impact of domestic violence on children.

The Awards committee representatives attended the University of South Australia

Selection Committee for the Grant in April to choose our 2020 awardee.

Our club established strong ties with this university when developing this grant and the university now promotes this scholarship and Zonta International scholarships on its website. Our committee member Margaret Peters has attended the university to discuss this grant and its criteria with the relevant faculty Honours and Masters students and their supervisors.

School Scholarships

The committee when reviewing its scholarship commitments with the schools realised that the club had no formal agreement with both Mitcham Girls High School and Adelaide High School. As a result communication was commenced with key school staff and a new contract agreement was signed by the schools. A meeting with the Adelaide High School Principal and our club member representative resulted in a useful sharing of the scholarship criteria and ways to further strengthen our relationship. The school scholarship holders for 2020 are:

Mitcham Girls High School

She Leads High Course

Our club, Adelaide High School and Mitcham Girls High School committed financially to the cost of conducting a She Leads High course for 20 girls, which was held in August and September 2019. Members of the Awards and Advocacy Committees contributed to the design of the She Leads High course which was eight weeks long with half the sessions held at each school. Committee members provided afternoon tea and attended the final two sessions at each school. They joined the discussions where appropriate. During the course, members were able to observe the development and improved confidence in these young women. A graduation ceremony was held at Adelaide High School and a few of the girls discussed the value of the course at our November club meeting. The young women who attended this November club meeting spoke of the increased confidence they had gained from attending the course that enabled them to speak up or try new challenges. This was a valuable partnership between our club, YWCA and the two schools with each partner keen to run a similar course using the same model in 2020 without the need for funding.

The Awards Committee partnered with the Membership Committee to organise our third musical fundraising event. This year it was a different venue, Carclew House, which worked out to be an appropriate place for a



piano recital and the hire of this venue was modest.

An audience of over 80 attended with refreshments provided by our busy committee and club members. Dr Gabriella Smart performed contemporary pieces from her Doctorate before leaving Australia to take up a music residency in Paris.



External Scholarships

The committee assessed and recommended applicants for Zonta International: Young Women in Public Affairs and Women in Technology Scholarships. The International Women's Day Luncheon Awards which Ivanka Jovanovich and Beverley Newberry attended.

The committee continues to promote the Young Women in Public Affairs with our school partners, UN Youth and the universities as well as the other international scholarships.

This year, I was a member of the District Jane M Klausman Women in Business Evaluation Committee to select the District 23 awardee. It was a rewarding experience to be involved in a District selection process.

Reduction in Scholarships

The challenge for the Awards Committee this year was the possibility of reduced club finances in 2020 and the impact this will have on current projects and scholarships.

A special meeting was held where the Awards Committee came up with various options for the Board to consider, if the club experiences further financial restraints and needs to reduce its commitment to some awards and scholarships.

The contract with the University of Adelaide Zonta Honours Scholarship expired in 2019 and discussions had commenced about signing a new contract. The Awards Committee recommended to the Board and club to postpone this scholarship in 2020. It also examined the Gender Prize with this university and decided to cease funding this prize, due to changes in the subject in recent years within the university faculty.

A further scholarship was reviewed and the club voted to no longer fund the Zonta Aboriginal Scholarship. This scholarship was available to one Aboriginal girl in Year 10 or Year 11 or Year 12 attending one of the 5 high schools in the DECS Mt Barker Region. The scholarship commenced in 2018 after lengthy discussions with the Regional Director and Regional Aboriginal Worker and was set up as a trial to explore the interest and demand for the scholarship. It had limited support from the schools and few applications in this year.

Some further fine tuning of the criteria was undertaken for 2019. Unfortunately there was further limited uptake from students and the schools in 2019 and this was not awarded. In view of the lack of interest in the scholarship and our club's tight finances the club on the recommendation from the Awards Committee decided to no longer award this scholarship.

2020 New Chairs

TREASURER'S REPORT

Unfortunately, Treasurer Jennifer Stehn was unable to complete the year and prepare the final statements due to illness. Preparing the financial reports has been challenging but made easier due to the well-kept records maintained by Jennifer. I thank her for her efforts during the year and wish her a speedy recovery.

I am pleased to present the unaudited financial reports for the Zonta Club of Adelaide for year ended 31 March 2020. Due to the current world pandemic it may take some time for the audit to take place.

The club undertook a number of fundraising activities during the year to support our program of projects. Our final activity, the annual Quiz night did not take place due to the cancellation of public events in response to the COVID-19 virus. The club did however receive some donations from early sales of tickets.

Thank you to all the committees and individual members who contributed to raising these funds. This has enabled us as a club to support the following projects and programs:

Zonta International Foundation Breast Cushions Birthing Kits She Leads Project Adelaide High School Scholarships Mitcham Girls High School Scholarships University of South Australia Community Engagement Award Domestic Violence service Our club's contribution to Zonta International to support our global projects was \$7,032.83. The bank balance at the end of the financial year was \$11,452.60, this was split between Administration \$6,558.10 and Fundraising \$6,401.52. This compares with a bank balance of \$24,412.22 the previous year.

Both Fundraising and Administration were significantly lower this year. However, our Administration activity for the year was much healthier than the cash balance shows, as it was strongly affected by receipts and payments from the previous year.

Receipts received in advance included: membership fees \$1,540 and sale of tickets for the Birthday Dinner \$7,102. In addition, club storage fees of \$1443 for twelve months were prepaid in the previous year. Carry over figures for next year will have less impact: with Membership fees of only \$220 received in advance and a small credit with District 23 of \$168.

The Fundraising Bank balance is always impacted by the contribution to Zonta International Foundation that relates to one third of the funds raised in the previous year. However the club raised \$13,289.38 in 2018/20 much less than \$20,257.39 raised in the previous year. This was largely due to no longer having sponsorship from Westpac and the cancellation of the Quiz night. This comes as no surprise as our Treasurer kept us informed throughout the year that we would need to make some changes going forward. As a result, the club decided not to continue with Adelaide University Gender Studies Prize and Zonta Aboriginal Encouragement Award. The club also voted to suspend the University of Adelaide Honours program for 2020 and agreed not take on any new projects in 2020/21.

The budget for 2020/21 needs revision to take into account the impact of the government restrictions but will be available as soon as the future is clearer.

I would like to thank the other members of the finance committee:

I wish the new Treasurer well and am available to handover the recording keeping systems and provide mentoring.


















ZONTA INTERNATIONAL

Zonta International is a leading global organisation of professionals empowering women worldwide through service and advocacy. There are over 29,000 members in more than 1,200 clubs in 65 countries and geographical areas. Zontians all over the world volunteer their time, talents and support to local and international service projects, as well as scholarship programs aimed at fulfilling Zonta's mission and objects.

Founded in 1919 in Buffalo, New York, USA, Zonta takes its name from the Lakota Sioux Indian word meaning "honest and trustworthy". Zonta International, its districts and its clubs are non-sectarian and nonpartisan.

Individual Zonta clubs extend membership invitations to local leaders in business and the professions. Zonta supports women's education and leadership through several programs. The Zonta International Amelia Earhart Fellowship Awards support graduate study by women in aerospace-related sciences and engineering. Since 1938, over US \$10.3 million has been raised to support more than 1,174 women representing 73 countries..

Zonta International, through its Foundation, also supports the Young Women in Public Affairs Awards designed to encourage women's leadership and careers in public policy, government and volunteer organisations. The Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarships support undergraduate study. Women in Technology was offered as a pilot program in 2019.

Zonta and the United Nations

The Zonta International UN Committee teams represent Zonta in New York at UN Headquarters; in Geneva at the UN Office and ILO headquarters; in Vienna at the UN Office; and in Paris at UNESCO. The teams ensure that Zonta's priorities are presented, and that the Zonta voice is clear in mission-related meetings at their respective sites. They meet and work with decision-makers from UN agencies and countries where Zonta has funded projects and/or where Zonta clubs reside. The current priority area of focus is the Sustainable Development Goals, which set the UN agenda for the next 15 years, concentrating on Goal 5 and areas that relate to women's empowerment. The teams also monitor and report on ongoing issues such as human trafficking, women's employment, human rights, the gender pay gap, and much more. Team members work in coalition with other like-minded organisations on issues of mutual concern, such as early and child marriage.

Every year, the Zonta International Foundation, a not-for-profit charitable organisation, provides more than US\$1 million for programs that benefit thousands of women around the world.


