The Service Committee continues our regular Tuesday work at the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service.

On Friday the 11<sup>th</sup> of August Mary and I attended the Breast Care Cushions sewing bee at St Peters. Despite the absence of quite a few of our regular helpers who were travelling, we completed an impressive 140 breast care cushions.

Thank you to the usual kind packing volunteers: Mary, Wendy, Bev and Angela for offering to assist packing at my place on Saturday the 12<sup>th</sup>. However, unfortunately this had to be cancelled because I developed a raging throat and chest infection.

Fortunately I was able to complete the sewing and stuffing of the unfinished cushions, as well as pack the 140 cushions at home during the week, ready for delivery to St Andrew's Hospital on Friday the 18<sup>th</sup>. This little setback slowed us down in the usually swift process but the hospital representatives expressed genuine gratitude for our kindness and assistance.

The Advocacy Committee is exploring Sustainable Development Goals. This is a summary regarding progress:

At the midpoint of Agenda 2030, the SDGs are in jeopardy as progress stalls amid the climate crisis, economic fluctuations, conflicts and pandemic aftermath. An SDG Summit on September 18-19 in New York, under the auspices of the United Nations General Assembly, is set to catalyse renewed efforts towards accelerating progress on the SDGs, serving as a vital roadmap out of these challenges. Heads of State, governments, political and thought leaders from various sectors, along with civil society, women, youth and other stakeholders, will convene at the UN Headquarters in New York to raise ambition and transformative action to ensure the targets set in 2015 are met.



## SDG 5 – GENDER EQUALITY

COVID-19 generated new pressures on women and girls. In 2020, women with children at home on average spent 31 hours per week on childcare – five hours more than before the pandemic. When schools and preschools closed during COVID-19, women shouldered most of the childcare – and nearly 60 per cent of countries took no steps to offset this increase in unpaid work. Due to the increasing pressures of unpaid care, more than two million women left the workforce. Globally, employment for women fell by 4.2 per cent compared with 3 per cent for men. Approximately 12 million women experienced disruptions in birth control, resulting in 1.4 million unwanted pregnancies, in 2020.

In many countries there were much higher call volumes on emergency hotlines for violence against women. One in four women reported increased household conflict and intimate partner violence. UNICEF estimates that by 2030 due to COVID-19 around 10 million more girls will be at risk of child marriage. Similarly, other harmful practices such as female genital mutilation (FGM) increased during the pandemic as girls were kept home, away from the protective environment of schools. Disruption to services may lead to 2 million more FGM cases over the next decade. Globally, most frontline workers are women, who make up about 70 per cent of health workers and first responders, which puts them at continuous high risk of infection. But they are less likely to be in charge:

Notably, in 2020 women held only 24 per cent of seats on COVID-19 taskforces and while the proportion of seats held by women in national parliaments and local governments has steadily increased in recent years, in 2023, women held only 26.5 per cent of seats in lower and single chambers of parliaments and 35.4 per cent in local government. In addition to impacts from the pandemic, women's sexual and reproductive health have been affected by in legal restrictions, recent social backlashes, and vulnerabilities experienced through violent conflict and climate change. Progress on the 2030 Agenda 1085 cannot be achieved if half the human race is left behind. Advancing on SDG 5 can untap 1086 huge potential and have multiplier effects across the SDGs.



## A long way to go by Tasia Pertsinidis

The Zonta Club of Adelaide's Vice President, Mrs Colleen Tomlian, spoke to a meeting of thirty five people about a Women's Studies course found in South Australian public schools.

Year 11 and year 12 students at Mitcham Girls High school are some students doing the course which will help them benefit from more choices in society.

Mrs Tomlian said it was "a South Australian tradition" to provide gender-based education, as Women's Studies courses also were in University curriculums here.

The 2023 High School course explains why the course is important in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, and how conceptual ideas in relation to gender, gender identity and Feminism have changed.

Mrs Tomlian said Feminism traditionally was linked to Marx and Socialism, and other types of Feminism such as Eco Feminism, emerged from that.

Mrs Tomlian said student's view about gender, masculinity, feminity, gender dichotomy, and Feminism need to be "adaptable so students can focus on any cultures". The "students need empowerment... to make things better."

"We need to identify, describe, examine, and communicate women's lives, look at a person's public and political identity, and compare/contrast that to positions of authority outside the home," Mrs Tomlian said.

Cultural tests used to examine Feminism included art, film and literature. Students at Mitcham High School looked at Women and Art in Parisian Society in the 1920's and women and work, attitudes towards women's health, divorce and its impact on women, cultural and institutional racism, women struggling to achieve in Parliament, and low numbers of women in Management and Leadership.

A number of items were identified as being of importance when looking at Feminism in the 20<sup>th/21ST</sup> Century, she said.

These included: National and Global challenges; Increasing sexism and misogyny; The Pandemic's social impact; Toxic language; The implementation of the UN's Sustainability and Developmental goals; Achievement of gender equality and gender equity, and it's not just a 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Century concept, as women also challenged works as far back as the Middle Ages and Renaissance.

The Status of Women Report Card indicates "we have a long way to go, and we need to take political responsibility."

"We should never forget that the position of women is the hallmark by which our society is judged," Mrs Tomlian said.
