There were more days making and packing breast cushions since our last meeting. Angela forwarded a report from District 23 about breast cushion programs across the District.

It included the following. *Based on the club reports received from 24 of the 26 clubs participating in*

the project, approx. 2600 cushions were made during the six months ended 31 December 2023. This is a great achievement!

Bridget and I attended an Area 2 Presidents and advocacy meeting recently. The main issues discussed were the proposal to form an Zonta Australia group to facilitate advocacy at a national level.

We also decided to refer to Area 2 as Zonta South Australia when writing to outside organisations, particularly when undertaking advocacy.

At our February Board meeting we continued our work on a risk framework for the Club. This will enable us to manage any risks before they become very difficult.

One of our members Ms Ivanka Jovanovich , was nominated for Senior South Australian of the Year. Our congratulations Ivanka.

The citation read:

Ivanka is a tireless contributor to our community who endeavours every day to bring warmth and joy to at least one person. She seeks opportunities to cook, drive, provide translation services or otherwise provide support to people in vulnerable circumstances every day through her extended network of contacts throughout the community.

Most significantly is her leadership through Zonta and the team of volunteers creating hand-made comfort pillows for women recovering from breast cancer is an extraordinary effort that has offered comfort, love and personal understanding to thousands of South Australian women, in many cases at the most difficult time in their lives. After two decades of service Ivanka continues to lead her team of Zonta volunteers in regular working bees to meet the demands of women undergoing surgery at St Andrews Hospital. Ivanka's work in the community has been significant..



On International Women's Day, 8 March, we celebrate all women, in all their diversities. We embrace the many facets of women's identities – intersections of faith, race, ethnicity, gender or sexual identity, or disability. We celebrate those who came before us, those who stand beside us now, and those who will come after. For as long as women have been here, there have been women's rights activists dedicated to challenging the systems, structures and cultures where inequality manifests.

In the last 100 years, we've secured labour rights, access to sexual and reproductive health and rights, passed laws protecting women from violence, seen women elected to the highest positions of leadership, and provided the world with an understanding of the root causes of gender inequality. DONATIONS

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Thelma Harvey

Our website is a great asset in drawing prospective members to our club. We have had four inquiries from people about membership which have arisen from the website. One of those people, Lynette Clunies-Ross, attended our Amelia Earhart picnic in the park and is interested in attending meetings and finding out more about Zonta. Hopefully, our other prospective members will be happy to meet me for coffee and attend an upcoming meeting.

Wendy Bruce, formerly a long standing member and former President of our club, would like to rejoin. We are delighted to welcome her back.

Our President, Kaye, has invited new members to her home for morning tea on Saturday, 2nd March, to find out more about Zonta's aims and objectives and to promote the convention in Brisbane in June.

Dr Sanjuga Vas Dev is an outstanding individual. Not only is she the Director of the Office of Women in South Australia but she also has served as a Policy Advisor, in Child Protection, and has been in one of those positions still rarely held by women - that of a Board Member! And that is after obtaining a PhD in Political Science. Throughout her career Dr Vas Dev has maintained a strong focus on gender and youth within that international context, as such issues can often be marginalized and put on the backburner for a while until they become attention grabbing.

Dr Vas Dev spoke about the Zonta Club of Adelaide during the early part of her speech highlighting the fact that the Club had “a great brand across South Australia.” “You also have a privileged position re issues impacting on women’s equality,” Dr Vas Dev said.

She went on to explain the unique position of the Office of Women, which sits in the State Government’s Department of Human Services where it has sat for a long time, and how the Office of Women has the opportunity to work on a range of issues which are of great importance but which can often get overlooked. Dr Vas Dev said that there were four key areas in which the Office for Women is focusing on at the moment and they included; how their participation team works with women and girls to enable them to be better represented in today’s labour market; working on the Gender Pay Gap through a Task Force established to deal with that specific area; how the South Australian Premier’s Council for Women is working on areas such as the prevention of violence, and introducing the Gender Equality Bill this year to allow reliable redress through the existence of Legislation.

After 10 years of research and policy analysis it became apparent that the area of violence against women also required more funding. She said there were various areas that the work in that area had highlighted as needing attention such as how to we “prevent violence against women, counseling services, legal assistance, how to assist women who need to get out of their homes, and how women recover from their experience and move on.” A Domestic and Family Violence Royal Commission was announced last year by the State Government in a bid to work with a much broader range of people in the community, and funding and resourcing has started to flow into that area.

There are now also Commonwealth and State partnerships and teams which look at strategic thinking and negotiation in the area of Women’s Safety, and a Family Safety Network, leading to a Domestic Violence system which works more effectively, Dr Vas Dev said. The Family Safety Network meets every two weeks in 17 regions in South Australia and involves both government and non government agencies who have an emphasis on harm prevention for women.

The Women’s Information Service is another body which is of assistance, and has existed for a long time. “It is one of the few face-to-face CBD spots where women can ask about anything. It is run by Volunteers,” Dr Vas Dev said. A big part of the Office of Women’s work is documented in the Women’s Equality Blueprint, Dr Vas Dev said.

Dr Vas Dev also spoke about the criminalization of Coercive Control and how her office wants to ensure that the legislation in that area is as effective as possible. She said that this State Government also had worked hard on the Gender Equality Bill, (an election commitment), which looks at the Public Service as well, and which the State Government hopes will be introduced in 2024.

A Safety Hub for Women has been set up at Colonnades through the Yellow Gate Women’s Justice Centre, allowing access to counseling, healthcare, and conversations about safety situations affecting women. The Office of Women and the State Government has reached into South Australia’s regional areas to establish safety hubs in order to keep women there safe. But those burning questions still exist. How do we prevent violence from occurring in the first place? How does South Australia reduce the Gender Pay Gap?

“If you are working in an organization, reach out to your networks and promote these programs,” Dr Vas Dev said. The Women’s Information Service is always looking for volunteers, so if you have spare time, do not hesitate – it is a noble way to give back to your community.

A Premier’s Women’s Directory exists, and it is evident that there still are not enough Women on Boards, so women are encouraged to send through their Curriculum Vitae.

Be part of the change to a new society – one which promotes a better understanding of women and through that a better future for women!
