PRESIDENT'S REPORT ROSIE EGAN

Our club is growing, as evidenced by our February 2025 total of 49 Adelaide Zonta members. We have four new members, with Vonney Karpinski inducted at the 2024 Christmas Lunch and Karen Bellchambers, Lucy McDonald and Melissa Klenke inducted at our February meeting.

Our new members are up and running, with Melissa assisting with Adelaide Zonta's website and with the Service Committee at the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service, Vonney raising money at our Billabong Walk and donating an original water

colour for the IWD breakfast raffle, Karen assisting at the IWD breakfast and with birthing kits in the future and Lucy assisting with the Young Women Leader's program as well as helping with catering at the November Open Garden.

The Biennial Goals of Club Success and a Credible and Visible Voice are evident through the actions of these new members, both through our increased numbers and through their involvement in these Zonta initiatives.

The new year has started with a range of activities planned for the year ahead.

March promises to be a busy month, starting with the presentation of Zonta scholarships at Mitcham Girls High School on 4 March, organised by Colleen Tomlian and Jill Olifent and presented by Raema & Rosie.

Our International Woman's Day breakfast at the Norwood Function Centre on 7 March is listed in the Office for Women's SA Women's Week, an inaugural event celebrating women's achievements and contributions in South Australia during this week.

A team of Zonta members will be assisting at the IWD breakfast, with Sue & Karen welcoming guests, Desi & Mel organising the raffle, Kaye managing the IWD live-streaming and Bailee assisting with photos and IT. Raffle prizes include a hamper created by Margie, Louise and Maxine, an original watercolour created and donated by Vonney, a beautiful Indigenous painting generously given by Mel and a plant from The Unley Conservatory. IWD ribbons sourced by Bridget will be gifted to attendees.

Supporting UN Women Australia, this event is hosted by Penny Wong and features prize-winning Indigenous film-maker Rachel Perkins as the guest speaker. The UN IWD theme is March Forward – it's time to turn promises into progress.

We're hoping for a very successful event, promoting a gender equal future.

Advocacy Committee member Heather Luke will be distributing flyers at the breakfast, raising awareness of and outlining ways to support Seeds of Affinity, an organisation assisting women both in prison, and when leaving incarceration.

The Young Women in Leadership Award Ceremony will take place at Government House on Wednesday 26 March. Area 2 Director Jenni Foreman has been active in organising and promoting this event, with Raema working with schools to encourage young women to apply. The club approved the prize of \$500 at our February meeting for the successful candidate from the Zonta Club of Adelaide.

Zonta D23 Area 2 Clubs invite members to a special screening of 'Songs Inside' on Sunday 30 March at the Royal Theatre at 2.30 pm. The healing power of music is explored within the Adelaide Women's Prison in this film, which promises to be an uplifting presentation.

The District 23 Area 2 Workshop will be held on 17 May at the Payneham Library. Titled 'Making Cents', the meeting promises to be an exciting day of planning and exchanging ideas.

District 23 Lt Governor Wendy Quinn has offered to run Zonta Spirit Workshops for interested members after this event. The workshop will focus upon improving Zonta spirit within our club. Please see me if you are interested in attending.

International Advocacy

Zonta International from time to time issues papers on topics that are important to societies and communities around the world. The most recent Statement issued by Zonta International this month, addresses the roll-back of women's rights globally.

Zonta International remains steadfast in its mission to build a better world for women and girls. For over 100 years Zonta International and its members have fought hard to advance the rights of women and girls around the world. Sadly, over the last several years, we have witnessed a systematic disturbing rollback of women's rights globally. These efforts to undermine the rights of women and girls, coupled with now an alarming significant decrease in funding for development aid from the United States and several European countries, are both deeply troubling and regressive actions that threaten the fundamental hard-won progress achieved in advancing gender equality, human rights and sustainable development.

Undermining women's rights, cutting critical funding for programs that empower women and girls, and disregarding the needs of the most vulnerable populations, set back decades of work toward a fairer, more just world not only for women and girls but for entire societies. Attacks on women's rights and cuts to critical funding not only harm individuals but also destabilize [international] efforts to fight poverty, inequality and oppression. This short-sighted approach weakens global partnerships and betrays the values of equity and human dignity that should guide us all.

Similarly, the reduction in development aid threatens vital efforts to address poverty, inequality, and climate change, all of which disproportionately affect marginalized communities, and especially women and children. As global challenges continue to affect the most vulnerable among us, it is crucial that we come together to support organizations that are on the front lines of providing lifesaving aid and promoting human dignity.

Zonta International supports this work through our long-standing partnerships with UNFPA and UNICEF, organizations that work tirelessly to protect and advance the rights and well-being of children, women and families around the world. Zonta International and Zonta Foundation for Women do not receive any government funding, and our contributions to UNFPA and UNICEF will continue to support critical programs to prevent violence against women and girls, advance climate justice and end child marriage.

We will continue to recognize and support women's educational and professional advancement in aerospace engineering, space sciences, broader STEM fields and business leadership globally through the Zonta International Amelia Earhart Fellowship, Zonta Women in STEM Award and Zonta Women in Business Leadership Award. Our Zonta Young Women in Leadership Award will honour the brightest emerging young women leaders worldwide.

We want to reassure all our members and supporters that our commitment to advancing women's rights remains steadfast and unwavering, regardless of the political or societal pressures we may face

Our mission is rooted in the belief that every woman and girl deserves equality, justice and the opportunity to thrive. With the dedicated support of our members, friends of Zonta and our Zonta International Headquarters Team in the United States, we will continue to stand up for these values with courage and resilience, ensuring that the voices of women and girls are heard and respected, and advocate for the restoration of funding and the protection of women's rights as key pillars of global progress.

Together, we will not back down in the face of adversity—we are stronger as a global community united in our cause. Thank you for standing with us and with the women and girls.

To co-ordinate this event if possible with a city council and with the Nature Festival 2025, 26th September - 12th October. The festival is a program of activities and experiences all dedicated to celebrating SA nature in positive, creative and meaningful ways. This year the festival explores the theme, Flow

Description of event:

Exhibition of and by community groups, local government and businesses involved in supporting and promoting conservation and recycling in order to slow climate change

Where: Council premises, e.g. Burnside Council Ballroom, Hub at Glenunga

When: held over three or four days, e.g. Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday

Why: weekdays: to allow involvement and visits by school children

Weekends: to allow maximum visitation by general public

What:

A collection of stalls and displays about climate change and who is doing what

Displays from universities about courses and current projects, focusing on conserving the environment

A series of guest speakers on climate change

Scholarships for individuals or funding for schools to facilitate a project to benefit the environment

Who: Zonta Club of Adelaide to liaise with Council, e.g., Burnside, Nature Festival, to seek agreement and then liaise with other groups to seek their involvement

How: a leadership team from these groups to ensure involvement by bodies including:

Community organisations involved with recycling, preserving the environment, e.g. community gardens, Men's Sheds, Repair Cafe Campbelltown, Trees for life, Nature Conservation Society of SA, Oz Harvest, Friends of National Parks,

Prevention of soil degradation (john.boland@unisa.sa.edu.au)

Schools: Torrens water sampling, frog watch, etc

Businesses and groups that have a focus on eco management e.g. control of plastic waste such as CSIRO and Elisha and Matt Nettleton, who have created a business, Sustainable Plastic Solutions, which has so far reclaimed 3,000 tonnes of plastic and has created a circular economy for grain tarpaulins.

On Friday 14th of FEBRUARY, a large team of 22 Not-So-Silent Sewers worked for 6 hours to produce 183 breast cushions. This was somewhat of a record and took us from 11.00am through to 5.00pm. A magnificent effort from all of those amazingly dedicated women.

Our hostess, Andrea, had a visit from a neighbour who saw our industrious team at work and immediately forked out \$200.00 to donate to our cause. Such a generous gesture that reflects the value and work of our remarkable project. I have composed a letter of thanks to Dr. Neil Cresp to thank him for his generosity.

On Saturday the 15th I delivered 180 breast care cushions to St Andrew's Hospital. We retained 3 of the cushions for emergencies. Thank you to Ivanka for her always welcoming hosting.

We are always very happy to welcome new members to help us with the packing. It is an efficient process that usually takes us about one and a half hours. You don't have to be a Service Committee member. We start at 9.00am and finish at approximately 11.00am or earlier because we always extend our time to enjoy a lovely fellowship-building morning tea together.

On Monday the 18th of February I mailed off a breast cushion to a breast cancer recovery patient living in Happy Valley. I have spoken to the woman, Maureen, who is delighted that we have acted on her request via a Breast Care Nurse from Flinders Private. Sadly, this will be Maureen's 4th breast cushion requirement. We wish her well.

I have also sent a letter to another breast cushion recipient, Gabi, to thank her for sending a thank you email for the breast cushion she received at St Andrew's Hospital.

A warm welcome to our newest member of the Service Committee, Melissa Klenke. Melissa already has her Working with Children clearance so now she just has to follow the process with the SAPOL clearance. Last Thursday Melissa met with Alison Meneaud from the EADVS to have a conversation about the privacy expectations and the nature of volunteering work. We are very excited about receiving Melissa's involvement in the future.

I also acknowledge my friend Jan Wood who worked for many hours with me in turning through the cushion straps. These straps are always completed before the workshops Jan will be a guest at our March meeting.

Open Gardens have not yet resumed because autumn is always their starting point.

NCWA Triennial

The following resolutions were passed at the Convention held in early December.

Deepfake Prevention - The National Council of Women Australia urge the Federal Government to: Integrate gender responsive standards at every stage of Al development and deployment, ensuring that Al systems, including those capable of creating deepfakes, do not perpetuate harm, exploitation, or violence against women. (proposed by SA, passed unanimously)

Ethical Al Guidelines - The National Council of Women Australia urge the Federal Government to: Develop and adopt ethical gender responsive Al guidelines with a gender lens. It is critical to integrate gender-responsive standards that ensure the impacts on women and girls are considered at every stage of Al design, development and deployment. (seconded by SA, passed unanimously)

Gender Equity in Technology - The National Council of Women Australia urge the Federal Government to: Foster a technological landscape that is ethical, transparent, and equitable for women ensuring that technological advancements contribute positively to society, minimising a lack of perspectives of women and girls during the design and implementation stages. (seconded by SA, passed unanimously)

Women's Economic Sustainability Must Start in the Early Years - The National Council of Women Australia call on the Federal Government to: provide funding for schools to take a transformative role in challenging gender stereotypes, beginning in the early years, and directly support girls to maintain participation in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) across all levels of schooling.
