PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 2023-24 Zonta year has proved a very productive and active one for the Zonta Club of Adelaide. We have been focussed on improving the safety, health, educational opportunities and leadership skills of women and girls in South Australia and overseas. Our overseas contribution is through our financial donation to Zonta International to support their work.

The Club continues to welcome a steady stream of new members. This enables us to maintain and increase a healthy and active club membership. A number of these members have found the Club through our revamped website. Members have been welcomed at informal gatherings to inform them about Zonta International and to facilitate relationships between members.

We continued our work with the Leaders' Institute to provide leadership training to 10 girls from each of Mitcham Girls and Adelaide High Schools. At the celebration of the achievements of these young women at the graduation ceremony at our September Club meeting we were honoured to welcome the Governor of South Australia, Her Excellency, the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, to present the certificates. Families of the students were invited as well as a number of politicians and other guests. This program continues to develop and this year included interactions between the students and women who had undergone the Governor's Leadership Program. At the District 23 Conference in Perth the Club was awarded first place for the Greater Visibility Award, Category 3 Developing Future Leaders.

In addition, we have supported girls' education by giving scholarships to girls in years 11 and 12 at these schools enabling them to continue their education more easily. Also, a Community Development Grant was awarded to a student from University of South Australia. A club award was made for the Young Women in Public Affairs award.

Our advocacy for women and girls has included many club members marching in November for Stop Coercive Control, an event jointly organised by Zonta and Rotary. As part of Area 2 (South Australia) we have participated in comments on legislation affecting women. The Club has also begun work on how best to advocate for the rights of women in prison. In July 2023 we hosted the Area 2 meeting on homelessness among older women.

Club members continue to offer in-kind support to the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Centre. Support includes sorting clothing in the local 'shop', packing and delivering food supplied by OzHarvest and providing gifts for women at Christmas. A working bee with students from Adelaide High School packing birthing kits was also held. Birthing kits and breast cushions remain core business for our Club. The Club was also recognised at the District 23 Conference with a Certificate of Appreciation for the terrific work hosting 37 Clean Birth Assembly Days since 1999 and is now a Birthing Kit Foundation of Australia Gold Club member.

Fundraising changed from an emphasis on hampers for real estate companies to other activities. Erica Majba ran a very successful program on women artists which was both very informative and a fundraising event. Providing afternoon tea and holding a raffle at a couple of Open Gardens has also raised funds. St John's Grammar School students raised money for our work against domestic violence. The need to raise funds to support our activities is a continuing Issue. We have now established a mechanism to enable tax deductibility for donations through the National Foundation for Australian Women to assist.

For the third time we held an International Women's Day breakfast with about 90 people attending. Tickets sold out very quickly for the Convention Centre so the opportunity to listen to the live streaming from the Convention Centre was appreciated by all who attended. Annabel Crabb was a very entertaining speaker. This event has grown with people attending after finding it on our website.

We have had a variety of guest speakers at our monthly meetings including: Dr Michelle Jarlborn from UniSA on Tertiary Education for Women Ms Leanne Davies the Director of Wellbeing at Adelaide High School, Colleen Tomlian on Women's Studies Course Her Excellency The Honourable Frances Adamson AC Ms Mel Tate from Puddle Jumpers Carole Theobald on Zonta Says Now Dr Sanjugta Vas Dev CEO of the Office for Women in South Australia. Dr Kathryn Christ on Modern Slavery. Ms Carole Theobald on Zonta Says Now, Climate Change in Zonta

Special thanks go to the members of the Board who have worked efficiently and cooperatively. My appreciation goes to convenors of the committees for their untiring work and advice. Thanks also to the Club members who have undertaken the work of the committees as well as assisted the work of the Club generally.

TREASURER'S REPORT for financial year 1 April 2023 -31 March 2024

As Treasurer of the Zonta Club of Adelaide Inc. ABN 85 898 562 097, it is with pleasure that I present the Club's unaudited Financial report for the year ending 31 March 2024. The financial records and statements will be presented to BJC Accountants for auditing. I acknowledge the Principal, Barbie Jane Chiro for her ongoing support by undertaking this work pro bono.

The club commenced the year with a healthy \$29,265.85 in the Bendigo Bank Statement account balance and finished with \$21,540.11. There is also a Term deposit of \$10,000 that will mature in April, paying interest of \$450. With a combined bank total of \$31,540.11 the club has improved its financial position while meeting its commitments for the year. Zonta International requires Administration receipts and expenditures are kept separate from Fundraising receipts and expenditures. This enables the club to declare that all monies raised through fundraising after deducting related expenses, are directed towards projects and scholarships. I have reported monthly to the Board and the club using an arbitrary allocation of the Term deposit of \$3000 from Administration and \$7,000 from Fundraising.

The opening Administration balance was \$6,113.32 and closing balance \$5,542.39. Both revenue and expenses were higher than budgeted due to the Christmas lunch. This had no impact, as the event broke even with expenses fully covered. Membership Fees are the key source of funds to cover administration expenses. In addition, some members have found creative ways to raise funds by selling various items at meetings eg, hats, Tshirts, produce, umbrellas, jigsaws and by making donations.

Strong membership growth enabled the club to grow and adapt many of the ways we operate to streamline expenses and use technology to our advantage. Using a Tyro eft-pos machine has reduced bank expenses over the last two years. Maintaining an updated website continues to attract new members and give the club a professional look. The use of TryBooking for selling tickets to events has made the process easier for organisers, members and supporters. Storage of materials for the various fundraising activities while costly, has continued to provide members with access while no member has the responsibility of providing space. Monthly Board meetings have been held in the professional environment of a meeting room at the Mitcham Community Library. The laptop purchased in the previous year provides the Secretary with the tools necessary for the role. The club now has new Table Placecards and Business cards that will suffice for many years ahead.

The opening Fundraising bank balance was \$23,152.53 and closing balance \$25,997.72. Thanks to the generosity of members and the public, general donations received were \$1,304.85 and donations related to specific projects totalled \$3,605. The Birthing Kit project was supported by donations in lieu of flowers from the family and friends of Millicent Hughes, a past member of over 40 years as per her dying wish. The club donated \$969.00 to UN Women after running another successful International Women's Day breakfast. The club also contributed \$3990.56 to the Zonta Foundation for Women, this being one third of fundraising surplus from the previous year.

Key Fundraising activities during the year were – Open Gardens (with the half the gate takings for the February 2024 event still to come) and the very popular Fashion Parade. The annual Amelia Earhart Breakfast in Botanic Park continues to provide a pleasant way to start the year. The surplus will be donated to the Zonta Foundation for Women directed to the international Amelia Earhart Fellowship. The Women Artists series provided a greater surplus than the previous year due to an increase in numbers attending. Times have changed and some fundraising activities have faded such as: market sales, Community Lottery.

Projects and scholarships were largely the same as the previous year with one exception – the club supported local indigenous women attending a Voices Forum in Canberra. The club donation of \$500 was sent to the Area 2 Director, Lesley Siegloff to be combined with donations from other clubs in South Australia. The highly successful Young Women Leaders Program continued, with additional support from club members who contributed to cover the costs of the graduation. Note that an invoice from Adelaide High School for the annual scholarship of \$2,000 has not yet been received.

New fundraising projects are needed for the coming year for the club to continue to honour its commitments. The Zonta Club of Adelaide has applied for membership of the National Foundation for Australian Women and been accepted. This will enable the club to offer donors tax deductibility. For this initiative to be successful it will be necessary to act on the strategy to attract donors, provided to NFAW. The club will also be creating a PayPal account so that payments may be made to Zonta International without a member using their personal credit card and for the Donate button on the club website to be activated.

Thank you to all members who have worked to organize or participate in fundraising events, undertaken personal initiatives to sell items at club meetings and made donations to the club. This has enabled the club to continue to operate effectively to provide projects and scholarships to support women and girls both locally and internationally and to be in a position to support its members.

While I am pleased to pass over responsibility for the club's finances to the incoming Treasurer, I will continue to offer my support when needed. Thank you to the members of the Finance Committee – Helen Joraslafsky, Desi Zed and Carol Summers for their support in establishing a budget, setting Membership Fees and assisting with collecting money at various functions.

SERVICE

The 2023-24 year has been very busy for the Service Committee with making and delivery of breast care cushions, birthing kit packing and weekly work at the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Centre the priorities. Fund raising has also been a focus.

Breast Care Cushions



An unexpected windfall added to our production output this year when the newly appointed District 2 breast cushion coordinator, **Dr. Sarah Cunningham**, contacted our club to assess the status of breast care cushion production in construction, sourcing of materials, numbers produced and the hospital destination of those cushions. A flow -on from this has been that Sharon, from Adelaide Hills Zonta Club made contact with me about surplus breast cushions following the closing of the Noarlunga Zonta Club. Sarah delivered 40 breast which were taken to surgical level of **St Andrew's Hospital**. This was a timely gift as there were just over a dozen cushions at hand to tide the hospital over before our next construction and packing days.

Under the leadership of Ivanka Jovanovich and Mary Burford (Friend of Zonta) an annual supply of more than 600 breast care cushions has been produced

through our quarterly workshops with the Silent Sewers. This relationship also fosters and connects us with our Open Garden fundraising opportunities.





Birthing Kits



On Friday the 10th of November a birthing kit assembly was held at Adelaide High School.. The students assembled 400 kits packed birthing kits to be sent to developing countries through the Birthing Kit Foundation.

Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service

On Tuesday July 18, the staff The EADVS honoured its many volunteers with a morning tea. Volunteers from the Zonta Club of Adelaide and their helpers were recognised as well as volunteers from other organisations. It was a lovely gesture of recognition.

Our regular attendance at the EADVS each Tuesday involves packing and delivering Oz Harvest produce for the victims of domestic violence in one team. The second team sorts and curates the clothing donations to ensure the items are appropriate, appealing and in immaculate condition.



Christmas Gift Hampers

Most importantly, we traditionally assemble Christmas gift hampers for the victims of domestic violence in early December. Our members cheerfully donate suitable items for our gift- wrapping day and last year we had enough items to fill over 60 hampers. The staff at the EADVS were utterly thrilled with our efforts and reported many tears of joy from the grateful clients.



The Service Committee organised a couple of Open Garden fundraising events. In May 2023 we catered at an Open Garden in Mt George. This weekend coincided with Mothers' Day and was a big ask for members to give up their family time to fill the roster. This weekend was a successful and enjoyable fundraising activity. Our profits were \$2,644.47.



In February 2024 another Open Garden was held at Burnside. Club members donated homemade or purchased items like: cupcakes, log cakes, biscuits and slices that could replace our traditional scones, jam and cream offerings.. Fortunately, we had a magnificent response and we went on to raising close to \$4,000.00 This profit was significantly augmented with a share of the gate takings.

We held a successful **Elle and Elka** Fashion Parade at The Maid Hotel where 80 guests attended. Thanks to our helpers on the day and the many sponsors who responded to our request for donations with generosity and goodwill. The profits from the Fashion Parade amounted to \$3,859.32.

Di Lancaster is expert in providing Facebook data and has provided a report. (See details below)



ADVOCACY

As Zonta International and the global biennium strategic plan pivoted to a greater focus on advocacy across the world, the Zonta Club of Adelaide Advocacy Committee took the approach of increased visibility, information sharing and activation of Zonta as the objectives for the 23/24 year. Advocacy over the year took many forms to support this approach ranging from research projects, partnerships, public events, information sharing through newsletter articles & Facebook posts and guest speakers.

Research:

Research work has started to determine the needs of women entering or in prison and what the club might do to assist in meeting these needs. Members Heather Luke and Sue Jackson have taken a strong lead in this work that will continue into the 24/25 program of works.

Partnerships:

The club actively partnered with a range of other organisations such as Rotary and continued to nurture the already strong relationship with the National Council of Women. Committee chair Bridget worked closely with the Zonta Area 2 Advocacy committee and assisted with submissions to government including Human Rights and Homelessness.

Public Events:

- 29th July 2023 Zonta Club of Adelaide members attended and actively participated in the Area wide Advocacy workshop A Roof Over My Head. Advocacy chair, Bridget presented at this forum on the "Sharing with Friends" model currently being implemented by the Zonta Club of Brisbane.
- 13th November 2023, President Kaye and Advocacy Chair Bridget attended a Women Ending Exploitation by Prostitution (WEEP) information session to understand more fully the proposed legislation based on the Nordic Model.
- 16th November 2023, members President Kaye and Advocacy Chair Bridget attended the Adelaide White Ribbon Breakfast.
- 23rd November 2023, Advocacy Chairs, Bev and Bridget attended a SIN & Scarlett Alliance forum on the Harms of the Nordic Model. Zonta Area 2 Advocacy group has supported the SIN & Scarlett Alliance view and advocated against the Nordic Model. The bill did not go to parliament in the 2023 year and is now expected to go to parliament on 1/5/24.
- 25th November 2023 the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women, orange Zonta Club of Adelaide members took to the streets. In a strong partnership with Zonta Area 2 and Rotary, members took part in the November Zonta Says No Campaign to recognise the 16 Days of Activism 2023.

Apart from the walk that included approximately 15 members from the club joining other Area 2 Zontians and a multitude of other like minded organisations to march through the streets of Adelaide and to congregate at the Pioneer Women's Memorial Garden, recognition took many forms including actively promoting issues through Facebook posts.

The walk was an amazing display of orange shirts and caps (thank you Di) that provided visibility to the *Zonta Says No* to gender violence message. Orange is a colour recognised internationally for its strong message of saying no to violence against women. The theme for this years march for Zonta was to highlight the role coercive control plays in gendered violence and to send the message to policy makers that legislation is required

to eliminate it. Members held banners during the march to highlight the coercive control message. Similarly, most members now have orange shirts and caps to ensure high visibility of Zonta in the public arena. As a growing level of awareness, for the 16 Days of Activism, the committee encouraged Local Government councils to light up their buildings in orange. This was very successful with many councils across the State making a statement with their libraries, water tanks and other public infrastructure.

- 20th January 2024, Adelaide Zontians congregated on the Steps of Parliament house, again with likeminded partners to raise the visibility of the women murder in South Australia during 2023. As part of the Pay Our Respects campaign, the sea of orange shirts again provided the visibility of Zonta.
- 27th April 2024, in an organic response to the issue of gendered violence and another series of women murdered, Adelaide Zontians Rosie and Bridget joined likeminded community members to rally on the steps of Parliament House to raise the issue and demand action from all levels of government.

Information Sharing:

The Zephyr Newsletter provided opportunity with several articles providing information about global advocacy strategies including the work of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), the Sustainable Development Goals and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) in Australia. We hope that having interesting and important information easily available will assist to spread the word about items that we are advocating for – not only within the club, but more broadly. Thank you Verena for your prompt circulation of emails regarding advocacy opportunities across Adelaide instigated by other organisations.

Dinner Guest Speakers:

Dinner meetings over the 23/24 provided incredible insights into areas of advocacy such as Carole Theabold with her Zonta Says Now to Gender Equal Climate Action (we now need a teal buck hat with the Zonta Says Now Logo!) and Dr. Katherine Christ informing members of the complex and myriad of issues associated with human trafficking.

Finally, at the April 2024 Dinner Meeting, the club endorsed a proposal by President Kaye to take a different approach to advocacy within the club. With the growth in club members (a great thing!) the club will move to an issues based approach to progress issues, where members will be involved in the various projects based on their interest in the topic. This framework to support this will be finalised over coming months. Thank you to the advocacy committee for their dedication, input and passion for advocacy with an aim of making a better world for women and girls.
