Zonta Australia Urges Gender Justice in Climate Policy

Zonta Australia has written to the Hon Chris Bowen MP, Minister for Climate Change and Energy, calling on the Australian Government to place **gender justice at the heart of climate policy**, especially as the nation advances its nomination to host **COP31** in partnership with Pacific Island nations.

The letter, signed by Zonta Australia Committee Chair Bridget Mather, highlights the leadership role Zonta is taking through the *Zonta Says NOW to Gender-Equal Climate Action* campaign. This global initiative is grounded in the understanding that **climate change is both a human rights and a women's rights issue**.

Zonta Australia's letter urges the Government to::

- Champion gender justice in all climate strategies;
- Ensure inclusive participation in decision-making;
- •Embed gender-responsive reforms in environmental policy; and
- •Support education and leadership pathways for women in climate science and policy.

Zonta says now on Climate Change

On Saturday, 17th May, Bev Gum and Annette Brock joined me in operating a stall at the 2025 Environmental Expo at the Burnside Civic Centre. Our aim was to further the work of Zonta International in raising awareness of the impact of climate change particularly on women and girls. The Expo was very well organised by the Council with a variety of activities, award presentations, displays and of course, our stall. The office staff of Cressida O'Hanlon, MP, kindly printed our handouts for us and there were many interested people wanting to take copies and wanting to find out more about Zonta. We enjoyed meeting people and groups within our community who are working to create a circular economy and to turn waste into value.





On Sunday the 3rd of May Zonta ran a Birthing Kit assembly workshop with a group of Mormon women from a number of dioceses around South Australia. One group travelled from Kangaroo Island, while others came from Gawler and northern locations.

All together we had 200 women who worked over two sessions (morning and afternoon).

Bev Gum (Advocacy) was the contact point and organiser of this activity and assisting her were a number of Zonta volunteers. Many thanks to: Bev Gum, Mary Burford (friend of Zonta), Melissa Klenke, Thelma Harvey, Sue Jackson and her sister Linda, newly inducted member Georgina Tenney, Gerry Sanderson and her friend Ruth, who gave up their day to manage the process.

At the day's completion we ended up with more than 1000 Birthing Kits ready to be shipped. It was hard work to direct the operation with so many people involved and it took the whole of the day to reach the end. However, it was a positive and uplifting experience for all of us and we were rewarded with a wonderful afternoon tea and many sincere expressions of thanks.

On Saturday the 10 th of May two more Birthing Kit assemblies were conducted.

- 1. Mary Burford and Sue Watchman (Friends of Zonta) supervised a group from Campbelltown Rotary and African Disability to pack 200 Birthing Kits.
- 2. Bev Gum, Vonney Karpinski and Georgina Tenney worked with the prospect Uniting Church Community to assemble another batch of 200 Birthing Kits.

This coming weekend we will be holding another breast cushion sewing day on Friday the 30th of May. This time the Silent Sewers are meeting at Buxton Manor in North Adelaide. The aim is to produce 160+ breast cushions on the day.

We encourage other members to join us in this workshop because even if you can't sew, there are other tasks to complete on the day. For example: stuffing the cushions with polyester toy filler and generally undertaking non-skilled tasks like counting and bagging the cushions, or snipping the upper edges of the cushions mid-process.

On Saturday morning we will pack the cushions .This usually takes 2 hours (9.00am – 11.00am). This is then followed by a joyful morning tea and Gerry drives the completed packages to St Andrew's Hospital for delivery. Many thanks to our amazing member Ivanka who always welcomes us to her home.

On Tuesday 20 th of May, the regular team of Zonta volunteers at the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service experienced a lock down situation when an alarm went off. This triggered the creation of an Emergency Lockdown Protocols document specifically for the guidance of our Zonta Volunteers.

The Awards Committee will miss Dr. Margaret Peters who has been a member for 11 years. During her time with Zonta she has contributed initially to the Advocacy Committee as a member and Convenor and then moved to Awards for over 8 years, where she has had a great impact as a member as well as a stint as Co Convenor.

Margaret has a passion for providing educational opportunities for young women. She commenced her career as a school teacher progressing to university lecturer and then university administrator as Associate Dean University S.A. This experience and contacts within the university enabled our club to enter into discussions with this university about a scholarship for psychology/social work honours students. Margaret's attention to detail, negotiating and networking skills has enabled our club to provide 6 annual scholarships to young women at this university focusing on women's health and social issues in the community.

Margaret willingly volunteered to participate as a member or a Chair on selection panels for our club entrants for Zonta International awards, Women of Achievement awardees and University SA Grant. In the past 18 months despite being on sick leave Margaret has willingly taken calls from the Awards Committee Chair seeking her views on issues with the university and various awards. Recently she has been Panel Chair for our club nominee for the Zonta Young Women in Leadership Award assisting the panel to assess the 7 applicants.

Margaret has been an excellent role model for women showing how with hard work and determination she could balance raising her sons as a single mother while undertaking post graduate studies to secure an academic career supporting young women. This passion has supported our committee to constantly explore ways to empower young women through education.

We wish Margaret all the best as she focusses her energy on her health treatments and supporting her son through ongoing family issues. We know her determination and positive attitude with her own health battles is an inspiration for her young granddaughter as she adjusts to being paralysed and commencing a new school.

Margaret will be missed, not only by the Awards Committee but the Zonta Club of Adelaide as a whole. We thank her for her wonderful service.



Beverley Newberry's childhood experiences resulted in her wanting to care for others and in her interest in women's rights and joining Zonta.

She was born in New Zealand and at the age of 4 years had her life upended by her mother leaving her father. This resulted in her going to live with her Paternal Grandmother for 3 years and being separated from her father who had to constantly travel away for his work. Her parents divorced and the law at that time gave full custody to her father with no access from her mother or her maternal grandparents. She returned to live with her father for 6 months however, his work meant he could not care for her and her 2 brothers as well as work. She and her brothers then went into a children's home, where she stayed from 8 to 13 yrs, finally returning to her father from 13 to 16 years. Beverley came to Adelaide at 16yrs to work and live with her Auntie to have the support of a female in her later teen years.

Beverley married at 19 years and had 2 children. When her children were young her husband got Hepatitis A and was over 5 months in hospital. As a result, she had to work to support the family. Despite his recovery their relationship was affected, resulting in them finally divorcing.

Beverley's early childhood experience of "wanting to do her best" meant that she was a great asset in the accountancy firm, where she undertook clerical and bookkeeping roles and finally became the assistant to the accountancy partner. In 1981 an opportunity came up from one of the firm's business associates to secure a lease for a menswear shop in the new Burnside Village. She owned this retail shop for many years.

Contribution to Zonta and Community Agencies

Beverley has been active in our Zonta club since 1982 by bringing her organisational skills and her attention to detail in the Program and Communication Committee. Beverely managed our dinner meetings at the Feathers and Lion Hotels before Covid interrupted our meeting lives. She has for decades organised all promotional material, formatted Annual Reports and Zephyr newsletters and kept our history Archives. Beverley has used her contacts for free or subsidised printing as well as contributing her own funds. The club was awarded the best Annual Reports by District 23 due to the presentation of the documents.

She is known for her great fundraising events such as a Dance at Burnside Town Hall, Dancing with the Celebrities evenings, Quiz Nights and dinners. She would draw on contacts to donate and appear as guests or speakers at fundraising events.

Beverley was never shy of asking organisations to assist and in later years she was known for organising to pick up baked breads, buns and pastries from Bakers Delight the end of the day. She then distributed these to a Domestic Violence service, Anglicare and the Migrant Resource Centre.

In 2021 District 23 recognised Beverley as the recipient of the prestigious Heide Taylor Award, set up to acknowledge Heide's contribution to Zonta in 2011. In 1969 Heide became a charter member of the Zonta Club of Adelaide, the first Zonta club in South Australia and was an active club member until close to the time of her death. Beverley often tells the story of Heide bequeathing the role of archivist to her because she knew of Beverley's attention to detail.

On reflection of her early years Beverley states: - she learnt to never complain, look out for others and always strive to do her best. She also felt strongly that women should have equal rights with men and have the same work and educational opportunities. These are the attributes she has taken to her career and volunteering within Zonta.
