PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I'd like to express my appreciation to Bridget and Erica for their generosity of spirit and wise guidance as Acting Presidents while I was in London with my family. Thanks also to Desi for kindly chairing the July Board Meeting. Our club was in excellent hands with these experienced Zontians.

As we approach the end of 2025, it's important to look to the future of our club by engaging all members, especially the younger generation, by ensuring that they feel heard, valued and empowered. We are fortunate to have younger members, as well as experienced ones in our club. It is brilliant that these young members are involved in committees, contributing to social media updates and participating in and organising events. In the words of Salla Touminen, President of Zonta International, we wish to help these young women become 'a generation that creates positive change'.

She adds that 'The newly launched core values, Global Community, Friendship, Equality and Inclusion, Respect, and Integrity, are not just words on paper. They are also the foundation of how we engage with young people. Let's ensure that our Zonta club engages with all our members, especially young women, to continue to build a community across generations.

I wish to draw your attention to the core values of Zonta, as referenced by Salla Touminen. These values are the foundation of our club, and guide our actions and interactions as we work together to build a better world for women and girls.

In July I sent out the newly developed D23 Code of Conduct and Conflict Resolution documents. These documents are also available on the D23 website. Please ensure that you are familiar with these, as we build and maintain an organisation where each member is valued and feels a sense of belonging and purpose.

It was wonderful to take part in the Rotary Walk for Respect on Saturday 11 October. We gathered in Victoria Square and then marched with a range of groups, proudly representing Zonta in our orange caps and t-shirts.

The walk concluded at Festival Plaza, where keynote presenters addressed the crowd. Minister for Child Protection, Minister for Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence, and Minister for Women, The Hon. Katrine Hildyard MP spoke about the SA Royal Commission into Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence and the need for the community to be involved in prevention.

Professor Leah Bromfield, SA's 2025 Australian of the Year, revealed the impact of domestic violence upon children, while The Hon. Michelle Lensink, MLC, Shadow Minister for Women and the Prevention of Domestic, Family, and Sexual Violence outlined her support of the Commission's findings.

Since 2020, the group has collected, repaired, and distributed free phones through a nationwide network of 500+ partner agencies - including police, hospitals, safe houses, and community organisations.

Walk of Respect 2025

Zontians from all over South Australia proudly came together to participate in the Rotary Walk of Respect 2025 in Adelaide, standing united to promote respect, equality and the prevention of gender-based violence. This important community event also served as a meaningful segue into the **16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence**, which begins on 25 November and is marked globally through the **Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women** campaign. As cities and communities prepare to “**Colour the World Orange**,” this year’s walk reinforced Zonta’s commitment to raising awareness, amplifying survivor voices and inspiring lasting change. It was a powerful show of solidarity and a reminder that collective action can drive a safer, more respectful world.



CELEBRATING WOMEN'S ADVOCACY VOICES

Zontians proudly came together to participate in a special gathering hosted by BPW Adelaide to honour and celebrate the enduring contribution of women's advocacy groups across South Australia. Minister Katrine Hildyard acknowledged the extraordinary legacy of these organisations, recognising their decades of leadership in advancing gender equality, opening doors for others, and building a stronger, more inclusive state.

The event brought together a remarkable collective — including the Zonta Club of Adelaide and several other Zonta Clubs, National Council of Women South Australia, Girl Guides South Australia Inc., Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, Embolden, Pay Our Respects and parliamentary representatives Michelle Lensink MLC (an Adelaide Zontian) and Connie Bonaros MLC. President Rosie Egan, Area 2 Director Jenni Foreman, Robyn Page from the Zonta Club of Me Barker and Di Lancaster representing NCWSA attended.

This gathering was a powerful reminder of the strength that comes from standing alongside other enduring women's organisations. It celebrated a shared legacy of advocacy, leadership and collective action — and reaffirmed the importance of continuing to lift women up, open doors for others and work together toward lasting gender equality. It was both a tribute to those who came before and a call to keep driving change for generations to come.



Thank you for taking part in our round table discussion at our October meeting. We will continue to follow Zonta International's five step framework for taking action. We will gather the facts, lead by example, use our voice in our club and in the wider community, and we will advocate and collaborate.

Some good news: A company called Soft Landing, with its Head Office in Port Kembla and branches in ACT, WA and Victoria, recycles mattresses, sofas and lounge chairs, employing workers experiencing barriers to employment. It is a not-for-profit enterprise. In one year, the company recycles 433,000 mattresses, keeping waste out of landfill.

Some bad news: Choice Magazine at www.choice.com.au points out that, around the world, 3.5 million plastic toothbrushes go into landfill each year and they can take up to 500 years to break down.

Now back to the good news, Terracycle offers an oral care recycling program that turns toothpaste tubes and caps, manual toothbrushes, electric toothbrush heads and floss containers into hard plastic that can be reused by manufacturers. Do a google search to find your closest drop-off point.

You can also buy eco-friendly alternatives to plastic toothbrushes. Check out Colgate Recyclean, www.asuvi.com.au and www.turtletribe.com.au for toothbrushes made out of bamboo and cornstarch. Kmart, Woolworths and Chemist Warehouse stock eco-friendly brushes.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Three potential members visited our club at the October meeting. One has advised that she enjoyed the meeting but is not interested in joining at the moment. She will come to our meetings from time to time. One is enthusiastic and wants to become a member of our Club. She will have 4 visits during the next few months and then decide whether she will continue towards membership. The third has visited our Club several times and I have not had a chance to speak to her. There is to be a D23 Think Tank discussion on Membership issues and ideas via Zoom on Thursday 27th November. If anyone has any ideas/comments that I can pass on at this meeting, let me know..

On **Thursday the 9th of October**, Ivanka Jovanovich and Gerry Sanderson were invited to attend a wonderful afternoon at the Magarey Room, Adelaide Oval as guests of the St. Andrew's Hospital. Each year the foundation invites guests from the various organisations that support the hospital in many ways. A surprising number of professional bodies provide medical follow-up advice as well as therapeutic products that are made available for women who have been admitted to the hospital for breast cancer surgery. An estimated 250 people were present.



There was also a strong contingent of women who had undergone breast cancer surgery over the last year. Ivanka and I were absolutely overwhelmed by the tidal wave of these women who surged towards our table to thank us for our Zonta breast cushions that played such a supportive role in providing post-surgery comfort for them. We received \$60.00 in donations as well as a bag full of La Roche Posay products to include in our EADVS Christmas hampers.

On **Thursday the 11th of October** our volunteers at the Service attended a workshop run by Alison Meaneud (Senior Case Worker at the EADVS) to add to our understanding of the challenging elements of domestic violence: Why do women stay with their violent and controlling perpetrators? What are the categories of domestic violence? What do women do when they are forced to leave their homes without resources? What support is available to them? How can they protect themselves from future attacks? How do they deal with leaving behind (in some cases) their children, their pets, their possessions? It was a confronting topic and a hard session for most of us in attendance to experience. All of us were deeply impressed with Alison's knowledge and in the organised way the topic was presented.

On **Monday the 10th of October** I spent two hours with Margaret and John Randle, the owners of **Kinclaven**, 56 Waverley Ridge Road, Crafrers West. This is the site of our upcoming Open Garden fundraiser on **Saturday the 22nd of November and Sunday the 23rd of November**.

Kinclaven is a magnificent property set on two acres surrounding an amazing historical house Circa 1850. The property is truly impressive with a waterfall and ancient trees and fascinating features waiting to surprise and delight the visitors. Margaret and John have been kind enough to donate to Zonta, half of the gate takings in response to a letter I wrote to them expounding the wonderful projects Zonta deliver and how our fundraising underpins our ability to deliver on these projects.

I still have many gaps on the roster and I'm hoping that members will be able to fill some of those gaps. We now have the added pressure of manning the gate and that involves recruiting 12 more people to do that. The Silent Sewers will help us out to a degree but please, please look at your diaries because at this stage there is a significant shortfall.

On **Friday the 17th of October** a table of 10 ZCA members attended the Eastern Adelaide Domestic Violence Service annual quiz night. We didn't win the main prize but we weren't humiliated either. The bonus was that Linda Mackenzie won the Heads and Tails contest. It was a wonderful evening with lots of fun and laughter. The EADVS staff were thrilled with our continued Zonta support in helping to raise money in the only fundraiser they hold each year.

On Monday the 20th of October a group of sewing girls came to my place to cut and sew breast protection discs designed for women living in Fiji who have undergone breast cancer surgery. This is a new activity for us and a bit of a learning curve when compared with our familiar breast cushion production. The project was instigated by Dymphna Sprod from Silent Sewers and by the end of the day we had constructed well over 50 discs and all of us have undertaken to sew more in our own private time.

Thank you to those members who brought along gifts to the last meeting to contribute to the EADVS Christmas hampers.

I have now learned that Zonta is now responsible for donating All of the gifts for the women. The other donor, the Influencers Church, will provide all the children's gifts. It's never easy I know, and speaking personally, I find it hard to impose that expectation on you.. I have been collecting items since the beginning of this year and do have a reasonable stockpile, but we must fill at least 50 hampers.

I have had guarantees of donations from businesses I approached some time ago and I will be following that up next week. Please, dear members, I would be so relieved to get this support from you because the only time you can pass donations on to me will be at the next club meeting on November the 5th. A last resort is to bring items to the Christmas lunch on Saturday the 6th of December but that leaves me little time to collate and bag up in preparation on Monday.

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NCWSA AGM meeting 9/20/25

This month's meeting welcomed South Australian Police Commissioner Grant Stevens who spoke on Family and Domestic Violence. Since he last spoke to the group in 2021 a Royal Commission into Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence has been instigated. This was due to 4 domestic violence deaths in 2023.

Natasha Stott Despoja AO was appointed as Commissioner. A dedicated Advisory Group was formed. One year in and 136 recommendations were made, 14 of which related directly to SA Police. All 136 are to be supported over a 10 year plan.

The first recommendation for the 14 was for the Government to establish a dedicated service for Domestic Violence.

Multi Agency Hubs have been created.

Maria Hagias oversees all DV centres in SA. Two SAPOL officers have been provided to work in these areas.

Enhanced training is now provided specialising in DV. 6000 staff are to be trained.

A DV Disclosure Scheme is now in place enabling 3rd parties to contact police if they believe dangers are evident in relationships.

Reports of DV has increased but this is believed to be due to a more positive response. Time spent on DV reports/claims 2018 was 1.5 hours. In 2023 it had increased to 3.75 hours.

An SA Initiative is Operation Storm, which concentrates on DV perpetrators and delivering full force of the law as warranted and hunting down offender.

Recruiting for SAPOL has been a major issue which has become more evident since COVID. There has also been an increase in resignations, retirements and poaching from other agencies in the Government and private sectors. Fatigue is also an issue in the DV sector for officers.

Courses have increased from 6 to 12 and 50 officers have been pulled to help with training.

Diversity in nationality/culture and sex has been a highlight in recruitment advertising. Barriers have been lifted to allow progression for women through the force.

He also addressed current issues being triggers for DV such as environmental with droughts and now the algae bloom impacting businesses and incomes.

AGM Other business

4 retirements from committee mainly due reaching 6 year time limit for roles.

Positions were put up for re-election and have now been filled.

Build a Better World for Women and Girls

Summary

Bev introduced Erfan Abidi. She discussed the contributions of Erfan, an Afghan man who has been in Australia for over four years and has made significant positive impacts through education, particularly by establishing underground schools for girls. She also mentioned that Erfan has received numerous awards and was involved with the United Nations.

Women's Rights in Afghanistan's Past

Erfan discussed Afghanistan's history, particularly focusing on the period before 1979 when women had more rights and freedoms. He described how women were involved in education, the military, and politics during this time, and highlighted the importance of education for both men and women. Erfan expressed his passion for promoting women's education and equality, drawing on his own family's history of educated women. He also touched on the challenges faced by Afghanistan, including conflicts and restrictions on women's rights in recent years.

Afghanistan's Historical Struggles and Progress

Erfan shared a historical overview of Afghanistan, highlighting the country's struggles and achievements over the past 20 years. He discussed the impact of conflicts, including the Soviet invasion, the civil war, and the rise of the Taliban, as well as the role of extremist groups like Al-Qaeda. He emphasized the significant progress made during this period, including improvements in education, women's rights, and various sectors such as telecommunications, agriculture, and the arts. However, he also noted the challenges faced, including corruption and the recent takeover by the Taliban, which led to widespread protests and a mass exodus of people from the country.

Girls' Education in Afghanistan

Erfan discussed his efforts to educate girls in Afghanistan, starting with a hashtag campaign that gained global attention. He described opening underground schools in Pakistan in 2022, initially operating in secret due to security concerns. Erfan's movement expanded to include 300-400 schools and a thousand stores, providing education and resources to girls who otherwise would not have access. He emphasized the importance of keeping the girls' identities confidential and maintaining strict security protocols.

Afghanistan's Internet Disruption Impact

He discussed the impact of recent restrictions in Afghanistan, highlighting the loss of internet connectivity and communication with teachers, students, and international educators. He explained that online education programs, which were a critical lifeline for many Afghan students, have been disrupted, affecting their learning and mental health. Erfan expressed concern about the uncertainty of the situation and the need for global attention to restore internet services and continue supporting Afghan students.

Advocating for Afghan Women's Education

The meeting focused on supporting educational initiatives for women and girls, particularly in Afghanistan, where access to education has been challenging. Members discussed the importance of funding for teachers and students, including providing stationery and other resources. They also talked about writing letters to politicians to advocate for the reopening of schools and the importance of education for both boys and girls. The group agreed to take action by writing letters to government officials and approaching local female politicians.

Next steps

- ☐ Bev to write a letter to politicians regarding the internet shutdown in Afghanistan and circulate it to club members within a week.
- ☐ Club members to approach their local politicians or female politicians with the letter to bring pressure on international communities to reopen internet access in Afghanistan.
- ☐ Club to make a decision about financial support for Afghan underground schools at the next meeting.

Founded in 1919, Zonta International envisions a world in which women's rights are recognized as human rights and every woman is able to achieve her full potential. In such a world, women have access to all resources and are represented in decision making positions on an equal basis with men. In such a world, no woman lives in fear of violence. Its Objects are:

- To improve the legal, political, economic, educational, health, and professional status of women through service and advocacy.
- To work for the advancement of understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of members.
- To promote justice and universal respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms.
